

# Reports to the ACM 2018

First of all, thank you for the warm welcome Eileen and I received on joining the church in January 2017. Thank you to all those who worked so hard during the interregnum and prepared the way for our arrival. Thank you too to all the trustees who worked hard on your behalf and supported me. It is a privilege to serve as Minister of this church.

The church has a remarkable talent pool with many gifts and talents. A real bonus on joining was to find that the church has a wonderful pastoral support network in place; led by folk who willingly offer love, support and prayers to those who need encouragement and a listening ear; and I know many have benefited from this.

As ever 2017 saw a number of faithful members called home; we grieve for them but give thanks to God for their commitment to the church over so many years. May they rest in peace and rise in glory at the coming of the Lord.

One concern expressed by Rev Ruth Crompton in her 2017 comments was that my arrival might lead to a relinquishing of roles. I'm delighted to state that this has not happened; and it's been a pleasure to find so many willing volunteers keen to do the Lord's work in so many different ways and areas.

As Ruth said the task of the church is never completed and Christ's disciples are always called to strive for the kingdom. So, in March 2018 the trustees together with Ven. Andy Jolley and Rev Barbara Walls will be spending 24 hours listening to God to refine the church's vision and strategic plan in the light of that with the intention of sharing their conclusions at the ACM (due to snow, this time of reflection has been postponed until after the ACM).

So here is to 2018, a year which shall see some of our dreams and hopes come about. Let us continue to work together never losing sight of our calling to enable others to see the light of Christ and to point to Him who is our refuge and our strength at all times. For The Eldwick Church to be the lighthouse and a place of safety to the people of Eldwick.

## **Finance Report for Year to December 2017**

### ***Overview of Financial Year 2017***

The details of our financial performance and position are set out in the statutory accounts for the year ended 31st December 2017. There is a commentary on the results in the Trustees' Report, which is incorporated within those accounts. These will be presented for adoption at the ACM on 8th April 2018. A briefer summary of this appears below.

This was another good year for our finances. In particular the trustees are grateful that everyone continued to support regular giving whilst making such generous donations to the Building Fund.

### ***Financial Highlights 2017***

- Despite so much effort going into fund raising for the Building Fund we were able to generate a surplus of £2,265 in 2017 on our regular activities. This was due in part to some people reviewing their regular giving (which was much appreciated) and others joining the regular giving scheme either through standing orders or envelopes. We also benefitted from people donating time and expertise for building work, which saved expenditure.
- Tuesday Café has continued to be an invaluable source of friendship and income in 2017. Numbers attending increased during the year and the Café raised £3,441 in the year. Thanks are due to the cake makers and all those who work hard each week to provide the welcome, set up the Café after church on a Sunday or put the church back to rights after Café.
- Although we were not able to pay the full Share requested in 2017 (£51,486), we did increase our Share contribution to £48,000 (2016 - £46,818). In accord with the agreement between the denominations, £32,000 was paid to the Diocese and £16,000 to the Circuit.
- We paid £6,589 to various mission projects as well as using £973 for Messy Church and other local outreach work. This comprised just over 10% of our total income.

And with regard of the Building Project:

- We have raised £573,217 for the project in 2017. Of this £425,779 has come from grants from the Methodist & Anglican Churches, and various other grant making bodies. Some £147,438 has come from the congregation, village residents and through many and varied fundraising activities.
- Work began on the new hall in September 2017 and to date we have capitalised £173,000 of expenditure. Phase 1 (the new hall) is fully funded and there is a significant surplus of secured funding (over £90k) to carry forward into Phase 2 (church refurbishment and link to new hall).
- To enable us to cover the full project budget cost (which includes the provision of a reasonable amount of contingency costs), and to clear all/any project related debt we need to raise a further £137k (approximately).
- Our plan/approach to meet this gap is to continue our local fundraising efforts through to early 2019 (generating about £15k to 17k) and to pursue more grant applications. There are a number of the latter in progress, with the potential to raise between £100k and £130k. If these are successful, the project will be fully funded by the end of 2018. Obviously, the corollary is that

if we are not we will need to unearth other significant sources of funding. Options have been identified, but please pray hard that this will not be necessary!

Finally, a vote of thanks to our Independent Examiner, Emma Wilson, who continues to give useful advice and support whenever we ask and require.

Because of the building work these are now held at the Vicarage. Once all the work is complete it is intended to move back into church (probably around January 2019).

A separate working party called the 10<sup>th</sup> June group were delegated to plan the opening service for the new Church Hall due to take place on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> June. Present at the service will be Bishop Toby Howarth and Dr Roger Walton. This group will continue afterwards to plan the opening & dedication service for the completed project sometime in January 2019.

We have continued to experiment with turning the seating sideways for worship. We look forward to the opportunities and possibilities for worship which will be available when the building is refurbished and enlarged in January 2019

## **Mission & Outreach**

At the start of 2017 the Committee Members were Rev. Peter Mayo-Smith, Peter Nunn, Susan Oldfield, Chris O'Neill, Catherine Osborne, Jackie Burrows (Secretary), Jeanette Wallace (Chair).

This group has once again been very active. Two strands to our work continued- a people focussed programme and financial support together with practical help.

### **People Focus:**

Fifth Sundays in the Month are identified as Mission Sundays. In April we welcomed The Alzheimer's Society and at another service Embrace (Support for Children affected by Violent Crimes), in July the Salvation Army spoke to us about their work with trafficked people, which was an extremely moving service, and in October the oldest armed forces Charity SSAFA spoke to us about their work.

The charity baskets at the back of church receive offerings for the Bingley Food Bank and Joy. The Holme Wood project continues to receive any children's items and values our continued support.

Pause for Prayer provides an opportunity for quiet reflection and shared prayer and

meets in the vicarage on alternate Wednesdays at 2-3pm.

In addition to these activities in May the Church provided Victorian Children's Games at 'A Right Royal Do' in support of the Prince of Wales Park Friends. It was a very busy afternoon and lots of children participated in the games. The Gala Cafe was as busy as ever in the Hall in addition to several stalls in the Church.

A new Outreach event was the Advent Trail in which twenty four windows were illuminated on a daily basis throughout the village. Twelve businesses/educational establishments and twelve domestic venues took part in this event. The windows remained lit until 6th January 2018 and both participants and recipients responded enthusiastically. The community at the top of Swan Avenue were particularly pleased to be invited to take part and some of the artwork and compositions displayed were of a very high standard. Several people commented that this is the type of activity which fosters unity in the village.

The Crib Service on Christmas Eve was well attended even without the donkey.

### **Financial Support/Practical Help:**

The Church continues to make monthly donations to:

The Kathryn Mercy & Joan Grace Homes in Southern India and the Education of an Ecuadorian boy through Plan international. The work of the Children's Society and Action for Children is supported through coffee mornings and other events.

Sunday morning coffee money was donated to the Bradford Soup Run, Embrace (Support for Children affected by Violent Crimes), Beacon (Supports Refugees rehomed in Bradford) and Inn Churches. Donations have been given after services in response to individual crises throughout the world.

### **Other Activities:**

On Friday 2nd March 2018 the Eldwick Church will host World Women's Day of Prayer. The service this year has been prepared by the ladies of Suriname.

The Church Café at Eldwick Gala will be on June 30th.

### **The Future:**

By the beginning of 2018 three members of this group had resigned because they have been involved for over ten years with this particular committee. Another member had moved to another church. The work of the group has changed in the last four years and it has been suggested to the Trustees that the responsibilities of this committee be re-assessed in relation to the work of other committees. Presently three Mission services are scheduled in 2018 and the Gala Committee have again invited us to provide the main cafe on June 30th.

Sincere thanks are expressed to those who have served on this Committee.
